Annual Action Plan

This Annual Action Plan was developed by the Wild, Wonderful and Healthy Summers County Core Team. The annual action plan uses the strategies stated in the Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) to develop an annual action plan to address the identified health priorities over the next 12 months. Each annual action plan includes evidence-based strategies that focus on system or policy change, target specific groups, and/or specify infrastructure improvements that will support individual, family, and community change over time.

Priority Health Issue

While Summers County has a myriad of health issues on which we could focus our work, the Community Health Improvement (CHI) Committee chose to focus on a lack of safe and affordable housing for low-income residents over the next three years. The lack of safe and affordable housing in the county and city of Hinton, as well as the abandoned and dilapidated structures, have a detrimental effect on property values, public safety and health, fire safety, and economic development.

How We Are Organized

Through Wild, Wonderful and Healthy Summers County, we will build cross-sector partnerships to involve individuals with needed skills and experiences, to develop a Community Health Improvement Plan (CHIP) and identify who will do what when each year to implement our CHIP. We recognize that you have different interests and want different levels of involvement during different phases of the Community Health Improvement Planning process. However, there is a role for everyone in our community to engage in the community health improvement planning process and all are welcome to join us. To accomplish our work, we are currently organized into the following groups:

Goals and Objectives

As stated in our 2023–2024 Community Health Improvement Plan, (CHIP), our goal over the next three years is to **improve access to safe, affordable and well-managed rental housing.** To accomplish this goal, we have defined three measurable objectives that will guide our work:

Objective #1: Increase the number of safe, affordable, and well-managed houses for low- and moderate-income renters by 10 properties by June 30, 2024.

Objective #2: Improve community safety and the environment by demolishing 15 blighted buildings by June 30, 2024.

Objective #3: By June 30, 2024, ensure that city code and county ordinances continue to promote and sustain safe, affordable, and well-managed housing.

Accomplishments

Despite delays resulting from the impact of the COVID pandemic, we were able to accomplish the following:

- Renter's rights brochure completed and distributed
- Identified over 45 properties for demolition as of October 2020
- Over 35 dilapidated properties demolished as of June 2023
- Identified vacant property for construction of green space that City of Hinton has purchased. Worked with WVU Extension's Community Engagement Lab to develop plan for the space. Raised \$43,000 to construct green space.
- All Aboard Community Park open and community programs are planned and on-going.
- Team members selected to serve on the county's Dilapidated Structures Committee.
- At the request of the Hinton City Council, agreed to repurpose a small vacant lot as a green space; design has been approved.

- City has hired a code enforcer to ensure that properties in Hinton are maintained at the standards required by city ordinances. Code enforcer is a full-time employee of the city of Hinton and is responsible for building inspections.
- City has contracted to create a list of available rental housing.
- City is addressing housing issue, including absent property owners, in their 5-year plan. This includes charging property owners a fee if property remains vacant and requiring rental units to be inspected prior to rental to ensure the building is up to code.
- City established Land Reuse Committee and member of WWHSC core team is an appointed member. Meetings will be open to public and other core team members plan to attend. First scheduled meeting is July 11, 2023 at City Hall.

FY2023 Annual Action Plan

Our plan for Summers County is bold and ambitious. Thus, to accomplish our plan over the next three years, we must identify what work we can accomplish over the next 12 months. By defining who will do what by when over the next 12 months, we will be able to assess our progress in achieving our long rang goal and make any course corrections needed to ensure we accomplish our goal.

Our annual action plan for FY 2023, builds on our accomplishments from last year and lays out the strategies and tasks that will be accomplished toward accomplishing our goals and objectives between July 1, 2023 and June 30, 2024. We invite you and your organization to work alongside other community members as we address housing in our community.

Objective #1: Increase the number of safe, affordable, and well-managed houses for low-and moderate-income renters by 10 properties by June 30, 2024.

Strategy 1.a. Continue efforts to identify rental housing properties that require rehabilitation prior to rental as well as sources to finance and/or provide appropriate home repairs, contingent upon contractual agreement with property owners to rent the rehabilitated property to low- and moderate-income residents.
